Consumer Fireworks

Include sparklers and firecrackers. The tip of a sparkler burns at a temperature of more than 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit, which is hot enough to cause third-degree burns.

Safety Tips



Use fireworks outdoors only. Obey local laws. Always have water handy. (A hose or bucket). Only use fireworks as intended. Don't alter or combine them. Never relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and soak it in water. Use common sense. Spectators keep a safe distance from shooter. Shooter should wear safety glasses Alcohol & fireworks do not mix. Have a "designated shooter." Only persons over the age of 12 should be allowed to handle sparklers of any type. Do not ever use homemade fireworks of illegal explosives.
